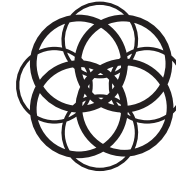

Contact Programs Contact the program directly using the phone number, email address, or web address provided. Be sure to share that you discovered the program in the Academic Enrichment Guide. This is the quickest method to contact programs.

Financial Aid Do not be discouraged by the cost of programs. Many scholarships are available. Always ask about scholarship opportunities.

Application Complete application materials and return them to the program as quickly as possible.

Pay close attention to application deadlines.

Neat and accurate applications make positive impressions.

Finally, keep track of your experiences to include on college applications.

Act Six

Youth Development

Sponsors: Augsburg College, Bethel University, North Central University, and University of Northwestern

Eligibility: Metro area resident, 2017 high school graduate (or 2016/2015 and enrolled at a two year college), interest in attending one of the sponsoring colleges.

Description: Act Six is an urban leadership development program administered in the Twin Cities by Urban Ventures that provides approximately 25 annual full-tuition, full-need scholarships to Augsburg College, Bethel University and University of Northwestern.

Program Dates: Weekly training March 2017–August 2017
Begin college classes August/September 2017

Application Process: Application process includes essays, recommendations, financial summary, transcripts and test scores, plus two in person selection events including interviews, group interactions and writing task.

Deadline: November 11, 2016

Cost/Fee/Scholarship: Scholars are responsible for covering the cost of their estimated family contribution (EFC), but will receive a full needs based scholarship if selected.

Lodging: During the training there are a couple of overnight retreats, but otherwise, it is not an overnight program. Students must live on the college campus during the academic year.

Transportation: Transportation will be provided for any Act Six off campus trips, but not to Urban Ventures or to the college.

Please note that not all applicants may be accepted because of a limited number of positions.

Description: The three-week residential program will focus on scientific research for students from historically underrepresented groups and expose them to career options in technology (with special emphasis in information assurance and digital forensics). They will meet positive role models in these fields. Sessions will encourage professional mentor/mentee relationships. Students of color and female students are encouraged to apply.

Program Dates: July 17 – August 5, 2016

Application Process: Complete the online application: <https://www.stcloudstate.edu/pipeline> and complete a 600 word essay on why they want to participate in this program.

Deadline: April 22, 2016

Cost/Fee: Free

Scholarship: Expenses related to tuition, academic fees, books and campus room and board will be provided. However, out-of-pocket living expenses for notebooks, calculators, snack, laundry, recreation and other incidents should be anticipated. Limited financial aid to cover these living expenses is available to students in need. Students accepted to this program are fully subsidized by the program's sponsors and some students may qualify for Minnesota summer scholarships as well. A copy of 2015 tax return (Form 1040), must be submitted for income verification.

Lodging: Students will stay in a dorm at St. Cloud State University and eat in Garvey Commons.

American Indian Museum Fellowship

Academic Support and
Skill Building
Cultural Programming

Sponsor: Minnesota Historical Society

Eligibility: Eligibility: enrolled undergraduates who attend a Minnesota university/college; and or a permanent resident of Minnesota. The MHS acknowledges the forced removal of Dakota people from their ancestral homelands in Minnesota. Through a grant, MNHS is able to accept applications of students from Dakota, Lakota, and Nakota communities outside of Minnesota currently enrolled in undergraduate studies at any university or college. There are two spaces open for students outside Minnesota. Students are not required to be enrolled in a federally recognized tribe; however students must be affiliated with an Indigenous community.

Description: The 2 1/2-week residential summer fellowship is designed to expose American Indian undergraduates to career opportunities and challenges of historical interpretation and cultural preservation within museums. The fellowship is for students interested in the museum field with an emphasis on American Indian cultural and historical preservation among historical organizations and tribal governments. Students will explore museum organizations and get behind the scenes of tribal museums, archaeology sites, and preservation labs. Transportation, accommodations, and meals provided.

Program Dates: June 2–19, 2016

Application Process: The following materials must be submitted on or before the posted deadline. Complete the American Indian Museum Fellowship Online Application www.surveygizmo.com/s3/2437771/99d5fc29abfe, one letter of recommendation, and additional documents such as a resume and employment history may be attached. Please submit completed application to Coral Moore.

Deadline: Priority Deadline March 19, 2016 Regular Deadline March 26, 2016

Stipend: Upon successful completion, students will receive a \$1000 stipend

Lodging: This is a residential fellowship with travel. Fellows will travel to St. Paul, MN on the first and last day of the fellowship, attend and participate in all required seminars and discussions, and reside in fellowship housing shared with other fellows during the program.

Transportation: Transportation is provided during the fellowship. Participants must arrange their own transportation to and from St. Paul, MN on the first and last day of the fellowship.

Augsburg College Youth Theology Institute (ACYTI)

Youth Development

Sponsor: Augsburg College (specifically, the Christensen Center for Vocation at Augsburg College)

Eligibility: Youth who are in grades 10–12 or recent graduates who want to engage in deeper conversations about Christian faith, community, and vocation; and will be able to participate in the entire week of the ACYTI.

Description: ACYTI is an intense week of friendship, classroom learning, worship, solitude, contemplation, discernment, and action on Augsburg's urban campus. Participants, mentors, instructors, and program staff learn together, pray together, play together, explore the city together, and discern God's work in our world together. Set in a vibrant neighborhood in the heart of the Twin Cities, the campus of Augsburg College is intentionally reflective of a complex, interconnected world. Augsburg is widely known for its core commitments—faith and spiritual inquiry, vocational discernment, civic engagement, and global understanding.

Program Dates: June 19–24, 2016

Application Process: The official application instructions will be available on the ACYTI website by February 1. It consists of two parts: 1. Form to be completed by the student with short answer questions. 2. Letter of nomination from a pastor, youth minister, or other leader who can speak to the potential fit for the youth and the program.

Deadline: May 16, 2016

Cost/Fee: \$250—covers housing, meals, and program costs.

Scholarship: The student's congregation may pay the full or partial cost of the registration free to help the student. If this is not possible and the student has financial need, the student or guardian should contact ACYTI program staff with a written request of need. If the student chooses to attend Augsburg College for their undergraduate degree, they may be eligible for a scholarship towards tuition at the college.

Lodging: Participants stay in air-conditioned dorms at Augsburg College.

Transportation: Participants must find their own transportation to Augsburg on the first and last day of the program. Transportation is provided to off-campus activity locations during the program.

Carleton Liberal Arts Experience

Sponsor: Carleton College

Eligibility: Students of African American descent or students who have an interest in African American culture are encouraged to apply. Applicants must be college-bound high school students who are currently sophomores.

Description: The Carleton Liberal Arts Experience (CLAE) will select 52 high school students who have just completed their sophomore year and bring them to Carleton, all expenses paid, for a one-week summer program. The CLAE program introduces the strengths of a liberal arts education through an array of courses in science, art, social sciences, and technology.

Program Dates: July 2–9, 2016

Application Process: ALL students must apply ONLINE! The CLAE application includes four sections: 1) A CLAE application, 2) A series of six essays in which students elaborate on academic and personal interests, community involvement, and leadership experience. Answers are typically a paragraph to a half-page in length. 3) At least one letter of recommendation from an academic teacher. Additional letters will be accepted as well. 4) A high school transcript that shows BOTH 9th and 10th grade marks. Unofficial transcripts will be accepted.

Deadline: April 1, 2016

Cost/Fee: All applicants accepted to CLAE have their expenses, including transportation, covered.

Lodging: Students live in the residence halls at Carleton College.

Transportation: Carleton provides transportation to and from campus.

Last year, almost 400 kids participated in weeklong camps, designed for all ability levels, for ages 6 and up. Whether working with sculpture, tiles, or wheel-thrown pottery, students will learn to work independently and collaboratively in a small class setting with plenty of individual instruction. Urban Boatbuilders Apprenticeship Program
