

Stipends to cover

The Summer Academic Enrichment program will provide stipends on a

first-come, first-serve basis, to cover all or a portion of the direct cost for students in grades 3-11 to attend eligible summer academic enrichment programs in summer 2018.

Who is Eligible?

- If you are a MN resident attending an eligible summer enrichment program, and
- You are eligible for free or reduced priced lunches, and
- You are currently in grades 3-11, and
- If you are in grades 7–11 you must either have an overall "C" average
 or its equivalent for the most recently recorded academic term in the
 subject area applicable to the summer program you wish to attend, and
- Funds are still available.

The Summer Enrichment stipend will cover the cost of the summer program up to a maximum amount of \$1,000. Students will only be able to receive one stipend.

The deadline date is established by the summer program until all funds have been awarded out to students.

MYP Youth Eligibility—The Minnesota Youth Program serves low-income and at-risk youth ages 14–24 who lack academic and "applied skills" considered critical for current and future workplace needs.
